This seminar will explore the philosophical and cultural history of the Confucian tradition in China, from its inception to the present day. Readings will include both primary texts and secondary studies, covering the Five Classics and the sayings of Confucius and Mencius, the Neo-Confucians of the Sung and Ming dynasties, and the "New Confucians" of the twentieth century. Among the general questions to be considered are: In what senses can Confucianism be considered a religious tradition? How is Confucianism in China related to the tension between tradition and modernity? Which aspects of the tradition are culture-bound and which are universally applicable? The last few weeks will focus on the question of position of women in Confucianism, both in theory and in practice.
