Course Description

This course explores various religious legacies and traditions both shaped by and for women in Latin America. Our survey of these themes will include readings and analyses of religious traditions brought to Latin America after 1492 and how they opposed or blended with existing indigenous religious practices. In this meeting and/or collision of world and cosmological views--a major theme in Latin American history-we will focus squarely on how gender roles were constructed and how those roles both celebrated and limited women's lives.

Paper is due Thursday, April 1.

<u>Book Review</u>: Read a book on a theme not covered in the course (Judaism in Latin America or African based religions such as santería or voodoo for example). Write a 5 page analysis of the book. Book review is due Thursday, April 8.
