COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Two exams will be given each consisting of 10 Identifications and 2 Discussion Questions. The two exams will constitute two-thirds of the Final Grade. Each Exam will count 100 pts. There will be no

make-up exams, except in the case of severe illness or a family emergency and the instructor should be notified at once.

The final third of the grade will consist of 7 true-false quizzes counting a total of 70 pts., the discussion grade of 20 pts., and 10 pts. for participation on the class discussion board on Blackboard.

A total of 8 true-false quizzes will be given in the term. At the end of the term, the quiz with the lowest grade will be dropped. Each quiz will count 10 pts.

No make-ups will be given for the quizzes. If you miss a quiz, that quiz will be the grade that will be dropped at the end of the term. If you miss more than one quiz, your grade will be diminished by 10 pts. for each quiz you miss.

Although the approximate dates are given on the syllabus for each quiz, the instructor may change the dates of the quizzes and the student is responsible for knowing about the next quiz even if the student has missed the class on which it was announced.

Attendance is very important to being successful in this course, and your discussion grade will take attendance into account. The discussion grade is worth 20 pts.

Participation on the class discussion board on Blackboard counts 10 points of the final grade . Every student must log into the discussion board and leave an initial message as proof that one has succeeded in logging on. After that, students can participate in the board's discussion as they see fit, responding to questions or articles posted there by the instructor, raising their own questions, making observations, posting news articles. Students are encouraged to initiate their own threads. To participate fully on the discussion board, students should post a message there at least 3 times each week.
