CHM 594 Spiritual Practices: Money

ANABAPTIST MENNONITE BIBLICAL SEMINARY Spring 2017

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COURSE DESCRIPTION (1 credit hour)

Money—a medium of social exchange that creates hope, anxiety, blessing, conflict, opportunity, and temptation. Students will examine the values related to money in the communities that have shaped them; think through their beliefs about money biblically and theologically; evaluate their current money practices in light of their faith, and develop a money-related practice to pursue throughout the course. (MDiv 3, 5, 6; MACF 5, 6)

COURSE GOALS

In this course students will examine their knowledge, beliefs, and practices related to money by 1) studying the Bible, 2) looking to a select theological topics related to money (ex. shopping, food, gift), and 3) practicing a money-related spiritual discipline.
